Florida is one of the fastest-growing states in the U.S., and Panama City Beach is not immune to that growth. As we enter the new year, I wanted to let you know about a few things going on in the City. We are diligently moving forward with many infrastructure projects to accommodate the rapid growth we continue to experience.

Some of these projects are the 17 lane miles of street resurfacing, construction of a new fire station, development of the next 1.44-mile segment of Gayle's Trails, and numerous new amenities at our parks.

The City is also seeing extensive private development, like the new hospital coming on State Road 79, another beach ER opening on the east end, new hotels, a large-scale winery, and a major golf attraction.

You cannot look around this City and not see our prog-



outstanding quality of life.

As part of the strategic planning process, residents reaffirmed what we already knew to be our number one challenge and priority: a better, multi-modal transportation system is desperately needed to enhance mobility.

This year, you will see how much is going on to improve traffic flow as we continue construction and expansion going east in the Front Beach Road Community Redevelopment Area (CRA) from Arnold Road to Lullwater to Hills to Lantana. This project, with multiple segments, adds sidewalks and bicycle and tram lanes to expand transportation options.

Also, Panama City Beach Parkway will be expanded to six lanes this year from east of State Road 79, at the entrance to Frank Brown Park, all the way to Nautilus, and then from Nautilus to Richard Jackson Boulevard. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) understands the main east/west thoroughfare through the City requires additional capacity to handle the traffic flow.

FDOT is also resurfacing Hutchison Boulevard, adding ADA-compliant sidewalks on the south side, and making other improvements up State Road 79.

Additionally, the City is expanding sidewalks on Hills and Alf Coleman, raising Alf Coleman, and making improvements to many connector roads that take residents from PCB Parkway to Front Beach Road.

As private developers invest in our community, we want to make sure they are good stewards of the environment and are preserving green space for our residents to enjoy. The City has added a requirement that subdivisions reserve space in their developments for neighborhood parks. We cannot stop development, especially in light of the increased demand for housing here, but we can put stipulations in place for responsible growth.

Over the course of the last

two years, we have been successful in engaging residents through our communications efforts. Open communication is paramount to a thriving city. Through our various social media pages and our website, we reach hundreds of thousands of people each year. Our City Facebook page, which has 117,000 followers, is where you can watch Council meetings, learn about upcoming events, be alerted to road construction projects, receive infrastructure updates, and participate in community contests.

It is my belief that transparency builds trust and creates public buy-in. We always want to convey accurate and timely information to you, our residents, businesses, and visitors, as community stakeholders.

In addition, anyone – regardless of where they live – can come to our council meetings and speak. Anyone can bring their concerns to PCB elected officials.

We know that we already

have a great quality of life here on the world's most beautiful beaches, but we continue to work to make it better. We have installed odor control devices at our wastewater treatment plant and we are anticipating adding more amenities to our parks, including a skatepark, six pickleball courts, new basketball courts, a BMX park, and more.

We continue adding public art around town through our SeeLife program. We have a contract for a revamp of the Russell-Fields City Pier, considered our main street. And we are getting rid of an eyesore on the beach with the Lullwater outfall project which will reduce beach erosion and the potential of flooding around Lullwater Lake

There is a lot going on and the future is very bright for Panama City Beach. As always, I appreciate your support of our City. Together, we can accomplish much. Thank you.

Crowds Swarm PCB Mardi Gras

Laissez les bons temps rouler!

Bonifay residents Courtney Collins and William Bush stood by the crowd barriers along with 40,000 party-goers thronging the streets of Pier Park as Panama City Beach threw one of the earliest — and largest — celebrations of Mardi Gras in the nation.

"This is my third Mardi Gras here," Collins said. "We love it — get to hang out, dress up and look like fools — legally!"

Led by the Krewe of Dominique Youx, about 40 massive (truck-towed) pirate floats paraded through Pier Park under a bright Saturday sun, the culmination of the festival's two days of celebration. The highlight was the procession of costumed and masked pirates from Dominique Youx, the Krewe of St. Andrews, and other pirate groups from elsewhere in the Panhandle flinging a downpour of colorful bead necklaces to the revelers.

For Scott and Lauren Dorman, the drive up from Stuart, Florida to Panama City Beach—their second Mardi Grashere—was well worth it. Asked if they had considered celebrating in New Orleans rather than at Pier Park, Lauren laughed.

"New Orleans is too crazy," she said. "This is just crazy enough!"

Although the formal date for "Fat Tuesday" doesn't fall until February 21st this year, the PCB Mardi Gras & Music Festival kicked off on Friday, February 3 with the main parade on Saturday afternoon, February 4. Tourists and Bay County residents alike thronged Pier Park in their masks and clothing of





gold, green and purple. Nobody seemed to mind that PCB's annual party took place nearly three weeks early.

Events included two parades earlier on Friday, a festival village, a costume contest, a 5K run earlier Saturday, live music on both days, and a wide array of food and beverages from vendors and restaurants. Fireworks on the Russell-Fields City Pier each evening added a fiery footnote to the day's fun.

With nearby Aaron Bessant Park closed for maintenance, event planners this year erected a Celebration Tower Stage in the east parking area be-





hind Pier Park Drive shops and restaurants. Performers included Chubby Carrier and the Bayou Swamp Band, the Frontmen, and Sawyer Brown.

The ancient Christian winter festival, staged prior to Ash Wednesday and the start of the 40-day Lenten season ending in Easter, has been a staple of the former French colony of Louisiana and the Gulf Coast for nearly 325 years. While Panama City Beach has been a relative

Johnny-come-lately, with the city tourism bureau becoming the primary organizer in 2010, Mardi Gras on the Beach is now recognized across the United States, said Visit Panama Beach President Dan Rowe.

This year, Budget Travel named the Beach's Mardi Gras as one of its "Top things to do in February."

"We are consistently ranked as one of the top Mardi Gras festivals in the country," Rowe





said. "Mardi Gras drives weekend visitation and provides a great opportunity for our local residents and winter guests to come out and have a great time

While billed as a stand-alone event taking place in the normally quiet off-season, tourism officials say that Mardi Gras here has grown significantly each year. Advance reservation data at area hotels and condos showed "a strong increase in bookings for the week" over 2022, said Rachel Banks, spokeswoman for the PCB Convention & Visitors Bureau.

Know Your Neighbor: Misty the Mermaid

If you have attended "Fin-Tastic" events such as Tourism Days, Zoo Boo, Chamber of Commerce First Friday, and Pirates of the High Seas Fest, then chances are you may have had a mermaid sighting. For Bay County resident Misty Joy, the phrase "Mermaid Life" takes on a very literal meaning. Misty the Mermaid can be seen popping up out of the Gulf for numerous community activities and bringing smiles to the faces of adults and kids alike.

Almost a decade ago, just before mermaids started their massive rise in popularity in pop culture, Misty Joy was making a change that would impact her life and start her journey toward creating a whole new "Mer-sona."

"It all began in 2015, I was working at Starbucks and my life situation had changed and I needed a way to support myself. I enjoyed my job at Starbucks, but I honestly believe the universe was setting up this path for me. For some reason at that time in my life, everybody kept telling me that I looked like a mermaid.

I worked at Starbucks with a girl that dressed up as princesses for birthday parties... I just started thinking that I could be a mermaid for birthday parties and try to be a professional mermaid.

I started looking at tails and one of the tail makers was here in Florida. I got this fabric tail from Mertailor and started following them on Instagram and around that time they put out a casting call for mermaids. So, I answered the casting call for mermaid models. I had this new understanding on life and thought, 'why not try for it, after all you never know what's going to happen.' So, I submitted my application and some photos, and they responded and said they would like for me to model his tails for his website. I was one of the ones chosen to model his 2016 silicone tail. Honestly, I'll never forget when the day was done and I got into the car, I had this amazing, wonderful feeling of happiness. I couldn't stop thinking about it. If you can't stop thinking about something, do it."

For Misty, seeing herself on websites and Pinterest was



enough for her to embrace the mermaid life and find more places to "stretch her legs". Misty would find a good fit at a local motel on Panama City Beach.

"After I got my new mermaid tail, somebody else from Starbucks told me there was a hotel that has pirates and mermaids on the beach. I figured out that I needed to find other places and


find a home. So, when she told me that Days Inn already has pirates and mermaids I reached out and started working as a mermaid at Days Inn."

For most people, being a mermaid would be enough to draw a crowd, but for Misty, the idea of adding fire-breathing and fire-eating to the character to create an even more magical experience was a temptation that she could not resist.

"In going through this transition in my life, I needed things to focus on and so I attended a Pole Fitness class. I went and instantly fell in love with it. After they closed down, I discovered aerial circus, fabrics and hoops which got me into the circus and performing arts. It's the same time period in my life where I'm just re-inventing and unveiling myself, blossoming and peeling back those layers and becoming something. The very first fire thing I did was spinning fire Poi. After that I actually went straight to breathing fire. I had a friend who taught me and from the very first breath I was a natural," remembers Misty.

For Misty, performing became such an important part of her life that she branched out into other characters for events in the community such as Elsa from Disney's "Frozen" and The Raven Queen for Panama City Center for the Art's Fright Nights Event in October as well as characters for Star Wars Day for Downtown Panama City. It is the love of the community and performing that gives Misty the meaning behind the characters and she has no plans on slowing down anytime soon.

"I love just being there in the community and making people smile. Creating experiences and memories for people, being the magic and making it fun, that's what I love.

The Lost City on the "Forgotten Coast"


Port St. Joe is a riddle wrapped in a strange history. It's also one of the best-kept secrets in the state and one of the prettiest towns you'll ever visit. Founded in 1835 as a deepwater port and linked to inland destinations by rail, St. Joseph, aka Port St. Joe, became an important commercial hub in the early 1800s, for a time the largest city in the state of Florida. In 1838, delegates arrived to draw up the first State Constitution in the years leading up to Florida's admission as a state in 1845. But the town's boom ended swiftly: yellow fever

swept through the town in 1841, and a hurricane storm surge a few years later wiped out what remained. The once prosperous town of 12,000 was reduced to only 500 residents. By the mid-1800s, Port St. Joe was a virtual ghost town. It wasn't until 1909 when a new rail track was laid and a new town founded that life began to return to the region.

When walking down Port St. Joe's main street these days, one wouldn't be surprised to run into Barney or Aunt Bee shopping in a local market. Though there's plenty of charm in town, the Cape San Blas area boasts one







of the most beautiful stretches of beaches in America and shouldn't be missed. The "Forgotten Coast" is a name the local chamber of commerce came up with after the paper mill closed to generate some much-needed

hype. Many of the permanent residents wish the forgotten coast would remain just that: "forgotten." But after several visits, I've concluded that "Unforgettable Coast" might hit closer to the mark.



Finding Magic on the "Forgotten Coast"

In the past, you'd wake up in Mexico Beach and swear it was 1955. The town that time forgot got remembered at 1 p.m., October 10, 2018, as Hurricane Michael came ashore, a category five storm packing winds of 160 mph. Today Mexico Beach is

undergoing a mammoth revitalization effort seldom seen on the Forgotten Coast. Its old-world charm is being replaced with brick-and-mortar buildings built to withstand 175 mph winds and rain. The "New" Mexico Beach is a blend of modern-day amenities and classic old-world

Let's Get Growing with Julie: Pruning Flowering Shrubs

Pruning is one of those landscape maintenance projects that sounds simple but is often done incorrectly. Timing and pruning technique is as important as the tools you use. I'm going to go over some basic tips for pruning flowering shrubs this month.

Why prune?

The first question you should



ask yourself is why am I pruning? Valid reasons for pruning shrubs include removing diseased/damaged/dead branches, increasing airflow or sunlight within the canopy, improving the shape, or reducing size. Keep in mind, the repeated need to reduce the size of a plant can be eliminated by selecting the Right Plant for the Right Place, but that's another topic!

When should you prune flowering shrubs?

The answer to this question really depends on which type of growth the flower buds are formed on - current or previous season growth. Pruning at the wrong time of year can significantly reduce flowering. A general rule of thumb to use when predicting the ideal time to prune flowering shrubs is called the May Rule. If a plant flowers before May 1, it is most likely flowering on the previous season's growth and should be pruned after it blooms. If the plant flowers after May 1, it is likely blooming on the current season's growth and can be pruned during the winter or early spring.

The following plants do not necessarily need to be pruned, however, if they do this is the recommended timing.

Examples of shrubs that flower before May 1 and should not be pruned until after they flower include azaleas, spirea, mophead hydrangeas, camellia, and Indian hawthorne.

Examples of flowering shrubs that bloom on the current season's growth and can be pruned in the winter/early spring include roses, hibiscus, abelia, butterfly bush, oleander, plumbago, and bottlebrush.

How to make a proper pruning cut?

The most common cut is called a heading cut. Heading cuts can be used to strategically shape a shrub if done properly. A heading cut takes off the terminal bud of a branch (the one at the tip) which contains hormones that prevent growth from lateral (side) buds along the stem. Removal of the terminal bud will stimulate new growth from lateral buds, typically within 6 inches of where the cut was made. Take the time to look at the plant and determine which direction you want new shoots to emerge - is there a gap in the shrub that needs to be filled in? is the interior too dense and more growth needed on the outside? Step back and look at the shrub periodically to make sure you are training the plant to grow in the desired direction. Use sharp, clean pruners to make an angled cut just above the bud where you want to stimulate new growth.

Mistakes to avoid.

Topping or hedging. Repeatedly hedging shrubs stimulates new growth at the top which shades out the bottom of the plant. This results in a "topheavy" appearance with little to no foliage at the base.

Using dull pruners. Dull tools can cause crushing injury to stems which increases moisture loss and susceptibility to disease, insects, and decay. Be sure tools are sharp and the appropriate size for the branch diameter to be cut.

Not sanitizing tools. To prevent the spread of disease, clean pruning tools with a 10% bleach solution between cuts. Bleach can be corrosive to tools, so be sure to oil before storing.



Using the Bay County Sheriff's Office app, the public can conduct an inmate search at the Bay County Jail, submit tips directly to Crimestoppers, search for sex offenders in their area, apply for employment at the BCSO, become familiar with their child's school resource deputy, learn about agency resources, see the top 10 most wanted in Bay County, become a part of BayROC's camera system, and read all press releases. The app will also push out notifications providing immediate information concerning critical incidents happening in real time.

Once the app is on their smartphone, the public can re-

ceive unfiltered safety messages and information without checking social media accounts. The app will notify them (if they wish) every time there is a push notification. Critical information will be accessible easily without scrolling through other posts or dealing with changing social media algorithms.

The origin of the Bloody Mary revolves around two of the world's greatest bars. The tale begins in the roaring twenties at the famous New York Bar in Paris (later known as Harry's New York Bar), one of Ernest Hemingway's favorite haunts. There, bartender Fernand "Pete" Petiot is said to have conceived the first rudimentary version. After prohibition Petiot moved to the U.S. where he refined his invention at one of my favorite bars, the King Cole Bar, located in the St. Regis Hotel in New York. There, in 1934 it is said Pete enhanced his creation by adding a few dashes of salt, pepper and cayenne, along with Worcestershire Sauce and lemon juice, to the vodka and tomato juice, which he served shaken over crushed ice.

The story of how the cocktail got its name is as unclear as the libation itself, but my favorite version of history is that Pete named it after a patron remarked that it reminded him of his girlfriend Mary, who was a dancer in a cabaret called a Bucket of Blood. No matter the history, today the Bloody Mary is one of America's most beloved cocktails... perhaps that is because we can drink it, guilt free, before noon!

Research shows that institutionalizing "date night" can protect your marriage from deterioration and keep you and your spouse more healthy, happy, intimate, and able to manage your life stressors.

Follow these six tips for Date Night success.

1. Make "Date Night" affordable. Don't allow date night to add financial stress. Decide how much you can budget for your weekly date nights. Your budget will determine the frequency and location of your dates. Most budgets allow for a weekly date at home and a onceamonth date out at a favorite restaurant for dinner or a picnic at a picturesque spot.

2. Decide when you will schedule Date Night. For at

home Date Nights, find the time when a "date" at home can be added to your normal routine (lunch, late dinner, night cap). Do NOT let other activities get in the way of this intimate time together. For monthly Date Nights Out, set a routine night (e.g., the last Saturday of the month) and get it on the calendar. Only adjust Date Night plans for important events that cannot be scheduled on another day. Your monthly date could be anytime. It's the time for intimate conversation, not the time of day that matters.

3. Decide who will over- see planning. When planning monthly Date Nights out, work together to generate a list of restaurants that fit your budget and that you would both enjoy, then take turns picking a restaurant from the list and making the reservations.

Today I'd like to talk about Levothyroxine or Synthroid. This is likely the most commonly prescribed thyroid medication in the world but this is slowly changing. This article may be a bit difficult to follow so don't feel bad if you have to read it several times before it all clicks. I usually spend about an hour educating patients about the thyroid with white board drawings too so 500 words may not be enough to get the full picture.

Thyroxine (T3) is the hormone that drives every metabolic process in our body, so of course, it's extremely important. It turns all the factories in the body on, which then burns more fuel, which means thicker hair, less brain fog, not feeling cold all the time, and maintaining prop-

Why Your Thyroid Medication May Not Be Working for You

er weight. We can get T3 two different ways. We can make it in the thyroid or we can convert T4 into T3. The thyroid is told when to make T3 and T4 by the brain. The brain secretes Thyroid Stimulating Hormone (TSH) which tells the thyroid to make T3 and T4. To make sure we don't make too much T4 tells the brain to stop making TSH. This is where Levothyroxine can be a problem.

As we get older the body slowly loses its ability to convert T4 into T3. That means the only way we can get T3 is from the T3 produced by the thyroid and not T4 being converted into T3. This is often when we slowly begin to develop symptoms of hypothyroidism such as slow weight gain, brittle hair, fatigue, etc. Unfortunately, since there is enough T4, the TSH many times does not rise to a level where physicians will consider it a problem. Many patients tell us they've been tested for thyroid and it's normal, when in fact they were not completely tested or the values were interpreted incorrectly.

If you do get diagnosed with hypothyroidism then most physicians will prescribe Levothyroxine or Synthroid which is a synthetic T4. You may already be able to see the problem here. If we are adding T4 to the system, two things will happen. First, the body will try to convert this T4 into T3. If our bodies cannot do this anymore then we will get little to no benefit from this medication. Secondly, T4 will tell the brain to produce

less TSH which will reduce the amount of T4 AND T3 produced by the thyroid. In effect, ADDING LEVOTHYROX-INE CAN LOWER YOUR T3 LEVEL! I see patients frequentlv who are on Levothyroxine who tell me they felt worse when their doctor raised their dosage. This is because each dosage increase can lower your T3 which is the ONLY hormone that

drives your metabolism. To me it's obvious. Hopefully it is to you as well now.

The first concert I ever saw was the Oak Ridge Boys. I was 2 years old. Mama took me. I pooped my diaper while they were singing "Elvira." My mother changed me at the foot of the stage as I was singing at the top of my voice. One of the Oak Ridge Boys gagged, midsong.

"That's Mama's little musician," said my mother, wiping my hindparts.

The next concert I ever saw was the "Grand Ole Opry." My father moved us to Tennessee because he was building the GM plant in Spring Hill. Mama knew I loved music, so she carried me to "country music's biggest stage."

I remember seeing Jerry Clower. I remember a bluegrass group practically lighting their instruments on fire. I remember Minnie Pearl.

During the Opry performance, Mama stood me on the back of the pew so I could sing along. She kissed my cheeks and

said, "That's Mama's little musician."

Mama bought my first nice guitar. It was the first "fine" instrument I ever owned. A Gibson. Student model, B-15. It was indestructible. You could use this guitar to tenderize meat. I still have it.


And it was Mama who bought my first piano on my 9th birthday. Mama bought a second-hand piano from the classifieds. She sent my father to pick it up. He bribed his friends to move the instrument with cases of free Busch. As a result, the piano was beat to heck.

I began playing piano in church at age 10. I was an accompanist. My mother was so proud. She always sat on the front pew at church and told innocent bystanding visitors that I was her son. "He's our little musician."

Throughout the years, I would go on to break my mother's heart a million times. After my father took his own life, Mama became a single mother. She struggled to make ends meet, cleaning condos. I threw my education away and dropped out of school. I helped pay rent.

As a teenager, I took my piano and guitar into dens of iniquity. I played in beer joints because I've had a lifelong love affair with Willie Nelson. I sang cheating songs and drinking songs that shamed my mother.

By the time I was a married man, I was a loser without a



high-school diploma. I had no pot to you-know-what in, and no proverbial window to throw it out of.

I was a construction worker. I hung gutter. I scooped ice cream. I flipped burgers. I even did a short stint as a telemarketer.

In my late 20s, I decided I wanted to go to college. My mother paid for my first class. It cost her almost \$100 for the first semester. That was a lot of money for a cleaning lady.

The first class I took was Creative Writing. The first essay I wrote was about a woman named Mama. The essay had water spots on it when I turned it in.

That one essay would change my life. Writing itself would change my life. Writing would lead me into producing newspaper columns. Which would lead me into doing speaking engagements. Which led to doing a one-man musical show, where I would tell stories and play an old Gibson guitar.

Over the last decade, I have taken this pitiful one-man show to 39 different U.S. states. I have played Mama's guitar all over the Union. And just yesterday morning, my wife got an email.

My wife read this email aloud. "Dear Sean and Jamie," the

letter read, "The Grand Ole Opry' would be thrilled if Sean would appear on the show... Please let us know some dates that might work for you."

I cried. My wife cried. My God. This had to be a joke. But it wasn't.

The first person I texted was Mama. There were streams running down my cheeks as I thumb-typed on my phone.

In only point-two nanoseconds, my mother responded: "That's Mama's little musician," she wrote.

So, here's to the woman who changed my diapers at the feet of the Oak Ridge Boys; who introduced me to Minnie Pearl; who made me what I am; who foolishly believed in her failure of a son, even when nobody else did, not even himself. Happy birthday, Mama.



The Most Important Thing You Can Do?







You can use resin chip, metallic epoxy, or stamped concrete, there are literally all kinds of uses and decorative options that homeowners and business owners can use to personalize their spaces and for different functions in their homes.

Kim: When you say polished concrete what do you mean?

Rob: Polished concrete is what people usually associate with a high gloss look on a concrete floor. They may not realize that colors can be added to that

Kim: I have heard you mention metallic epoxy flooring as well and I have seen the samples in our building. What is that specifically?

The new year has begun for investors. After watching both the stock and market experience significant drawdowns in 2022 (a rarity for the two to move in tandem), people wondered what the new year might bring. Thus far, we have been showered by the media with talk of recession. stoking fear in the hearts and minds of consumers. Eventually, consumers begin to over worry and they begin to snap their wallets shut. This, however, does not seem to be the case, at least not yet. At this writing, while the economy has most definitely slowed, many companies continue to make money. Seventy-one percent of companies reporting their Q4 earnings have surpassed expectations

Investment Strategies for 2023

We are left to wonder which is the greatest evil: a recession, inflation or deflation. Inflation over time erodes the standard of living and is not sustainable. Deflation, we think, is the worst of outcomes as it is a collapse of demand and it eventually pulls the economy down, perhaps into a depression. We are reminded of a quote Ronald Reagan repeated more than once: A recession is when your neighbor loses his job, and a depression is when you lose yours. A recession is an economic reset and investors are reminded to take note that when the economy is seemingly at its worst, that is the time to invest in stocks if they are long-term, growth-oriented investors and have the tolerance for the risk.

What is driving us here?

The Federal Reserve, whether we like it or not, has significant influence in the economy. The Fed has taken its Federal Funds Rate to 4.5 percent and by the time you read this may very well be at 4.75 or 5 percent. What does that rate do? First of all it is the rate it pays to banks and to money market mutual funds for deposits and investments made

The Fed has an average of \$3 trillion on deposit each night from banks. It also has about \$2.6 trillion from several money market mutual funds. If banks put that money at the Fed, they are not lending it. If investors and savers are putting money in money market mutual funds, they are not investing it in stocks, bonds, businesses or a host of other things. Since 2008, the Fed has used the federal funds rate to slow an overheated economy, usually one that manifests itself by the inflation read. If less money is available to the economy, that in theory should slow demand, bringing inflation down. It seems to be working. Some worry, however, that it may end up working too much and that the economy will crash land versus soft land. We will have to see.

The impact of this can be seen in the leveling off of interest

Short-term rates are remarkably higher than-long term rates. Investors take note that in times like these, that is by design. That can work to the advantage of savers and those wanting to have lower-risk investments with higher returns than in the past. If the inverted yield curve (where shorter rates are higher than longer term rates) persists, a slower economy will bring down inflation and also long-term rates, including mortgage rates. The implication is that investors should consider investing in longer term bonds be those U.S. Treasuries, municipals or corporate bonds. For retirement accounts, investors also might consider taxable municipal bonds for their quality relative to corporates and their competitive rates. Many investors can diversify their long-term portfolios by incorporating these types of bonds for a portion of their strategy. Investors might also want to consider zero coupon bonds, mainly in retirement accounts as a way of not only diversifying, but knowing what they will have and when they will have it. Zero coupon bonds are bought at a discount from their face value. Bonds have a face value of \$1,000 and a zero coupon bond may sell for \$750 now for example and be worth \$1,000 at maturity. The difference is the rate that the investor earns. Lastly, other fixed rate investments like CDs and fixed annuities offer lower risk and portfolio diversity.

Other considerations for times like these

We continue to think that part of a diversified portfolio should include increased weightings into health care, energy, consumer staples, utilities and financial sector stocks. Increased allocations into fixed income, or bonds could be part of a well-diversified portfolio. Lastly, we think investors should continue to watch the value of the dollar, as its continued slide would mean accelerated growth in international investments (which of course brings on more risk).

Last tidbits

We read that for the first time in decades, China's population has declined (by more than 850,000 people). We also read that in 2022, for the first time in a long time, many index funds underperformed the market. That might be so because index funds are weighted by market capitalization. With approximately 27 percent of the S&P 500 into the technology sector, and that sector had significant drawdown in 2022, that might explain it. Should China continue to decline in population, that has worldwide implications for demands as well as for pricing and inflation. Lastly, if interest rates slow or reverse, investors tend to take more risk in this sector.

Now that we are well into the new year, investors are encouraged to perform portfolio reviews with their advisers or on their own. Working with an advisor might deliver "alpha," that is, increased value for cost paid. Investors should also familiarize themselves with the latest changes in the tax code as well as the updates for retirement savings vehicles. Florida License Plates:

Specialty and Personalized



Florida vehicle owners have a host of options when it comes to license plates. More than 100 specialty plates are offered in Florida, with each plate supporting a specific organization and cause. From sports teams to universities, special interests and environmental causes, there's a specialty plate sure to appeal to just about everyone.

The Cost of a Specialty Plate



An annual fee is charged for each specialty license plate, in addition

to the regular registration renewal fee, a \$28 new metal plate issuance fee and a \$5 processing fee. The annual fees collected from the sale of the specialty plates go directly to the organization the plate supports, with most annual fees being \$25 or

less. Over the years, the sale of specialty plates has raised millions of dollars for the sponsoring organizations.

Drivers interested in purchasing a specialty plate can do so at any time at the Tax Collector's Office, though most choose to do so during their initial vehicle registration or at the time of annual registration renewal to minimize the expense. Specialty plates can also be viewed and purchased online for those with a plate expiring in 12 months or less. The costs noted in the online portal include all fees noted above.

In addition to purchasing your own specialty plate, The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles also offers a specialty license plate gift certificate program. The program allows anyone to purchase a specialty license plate as a gift for a Florida motor vehicle registrant. At the time of purchase, a credit will be issued in the name of the gift recipient, which can then be redeemed by the recipient at the time the specialty license plate is purchased. To redeem the certificate, the gift recipient simply needs to present a Florida driver's license or ID card. The gift certificate does not have to be purchased and redeemed at the same office. If thinking about purchasing a gift certificate for a loved one, please keep in mind that once purchased, a refund cannot be issued as the money is given to the sponsoring plate entity.

Personalized License Plates



In addition to specialty plates, Florida also offers the option to purchase

a personalized license plate. A personalized plate allows a motorist to request a specific letter and number configuration for their license plate. Individuals can order a personalized plate in person at any tax collector's office. The cost is an additional \$15 annual fee. An Application for Personalized License Plate (HSMV form 83043) must also be completed and submitted. Prior to applying for a personalized license plate in person, individuals should visit the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicle's Personalized License Plate Inquiry page to determine if the desired configuration is available.
