Four Major PCB Openings Set for 2025

Panama City Beach residents and visitors alike will enjoy an expansion of opportunities for dining, entertainment and sports in the year ahead.

Three new projects are on track to finish construction and open their doors to the public in the first half of 2025. They include the 60,000-square-foot **Pirates** Voyage indoor theater on Panama City Beach Parkway west of Pier Park; the 38,000-square-foot **TopGolf** driving range and entertainment center on Powell Adams Drive, and a new Mc-**Guire's Irish Pub** at 17290 Front Beach Road on the former site of the Boar's Head Restaurant.

And to the relief of all motorists, construction of Segment 3 of the Community Redevelopment Agency's massive street reconstruction project – SR 79 from the US 98 parkway to Front Beach Road, and east to Lullwater Drive – will be completed by mid-year

Under construction since



last summer, the \$60 million **Pirates Voyage** dinner theater is now in its final phase of construction and on schedule for a late spring opening. Workers in August completed "topping off" the external structure that holds 1,000 seats. Construction is now centered on the 15-foot-deep interior lagoon that will hold more than 600,000 gallons of water for the centerpiece

of the set that will house two pirate vessels – Crimson and Sapphire – and the pirate crews who will battle on deck, in the water and in the air.

Jack Lawrence, Pirates Voyage CEO, said that in addition to the 400 construction jobs, the dinner theater will employ 300 people when it opens. "This is going to be a show that guests to Panama City Beach are not going to

want to miss," Lawrence said. Two other Pirates Voyage facilities are in operation in Myrtle Beach, S.C., and Pigeon Forge, Tenn.

The city's attraction for golfers will also significantly grow in the summer of 2025 with the scheduled opening of the \$26 million TopGolf venue on Powell Adams Drive.

The two-story facility will feature 74 climate-controlled hitting bays with lounge-type furniture and high-top tables for groups to cheer on (or heckle) fellow players. It will also feature the company's "Toptracer" technology, which traces each golf ball's flight path, distance and other metrics.

In addition, the site will include a full-service restaurant, a 22-foot video wall, and an outdoor patio suitable for team gatherings and family events.

TopGolf's tenth Florida facility will employ 275-300 people when open, company

liners to popular spots like AJ's Grayton Beach, Bud & Ally's, Water Color's Fish Out of Water, Boat House and Lake House to 30A Café to Rosemary Beach Town Hall, and Old Florida Fish House there is certainly no shortage of venues hosting great songwriters and musicians for this event. officials say.

McGuire's Irish Pub whose existing venues in Pensacola and Destin regularly attract PCB residents and visitors on day trip visits - will open its third restaurant on Front Beach Road during the first two weeks of February, company officials

The 24,000-square-foot restaurant has been under construction since last March. When open, it will be able to seat up to 650 people at one time, following the same design as its counterparts. In addition to its Irish themed menu, the restaurant will feature live entertainment.

We're doing a lot of wood inside, hardwood floors, beadboard on the walls, a lot of lighting," Project Manager Daniel Rivera told WJHG recently.

The completion of the street improvements along the SR 79 corridor and Front Beach Road will mark a major milestone in the 24-year-old city infrastructure improvements, said Donna Montgomery, community outreach specialist with The Corradino Group, which is managing the multi-million-dollar project. One recent development has been the landscaping around



the roundabout at Front Beach Road and Arnold Road.

As in other phases of the CRA work, the project includes widening the roadway to four lanes, adding sidewalks and crosswalks, installing curb and gutter storm drainage, and relocating utility lines.

This phase of the Front Beach Road reconstruction has a mid-2025 completion target, Montgomery said. However, additional phases of the CRA road work are still planned during the next five years.

Construction of two additional Front Beach Road projects is scheduled to begin with bid openings in early 2025 with work to begin shortly afterward. Segment 4.1 runs from Lullwater Drive to east of Hills Road; and Segment 4.2 from the end of Segment 4.1 to Lantana Drive. The next phase, Segment 4.3, is set for early 2026. It will improve Front Beach Road from its intersection with Hutchison Boulevard to west of Richard Jackson Boulevard.

Basal Cell Carcinoma: The Sneakiest and Most Common Type of Skin Cancer

Basal cell carcinoma (BCC) is the most common type of skin cancer, accounting for more than 80% of non-melanoma skin cancers. Though BCCs are typically slow-growing and rarely metastasize, early detection is crucial. As a dermatologist, I've seen first-hand the profound impact that early diagnosis can have on both the prognosis and treatment outcomes for patients.

What is Basal Cell Carcinoma?

Basal cell carcinoma originates from the basal cells at the bottom of the epidermis (the outer layer of the skin). Unlike other types of skin cancer, such as melanoma, BCCs tend to stay localized, meaning they

usually don't spread to other parts of the body. However, they can grow deeply into the skin, causing significant local tissue damage if left untreated.

Common Risk Factors for BCC

Excessive sun exposure: Ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun is a leading cause of BCCs

Fair skin: People with lighter skin, hair, and eyes are more prone to developing BCCs.

Age: Basal cell carcinoma is most common in individuals over the age of 50, although it can occur at any age.

Family history: A history of skin cancer in the family increases your risk.

Immunosuppression: Those who have compromised immune systems (e.g., organ transplant recipients) are at higher risk.

Previous skin cancers: A history of BCC or other types of skin cancer increases the risk of developing new lesions.

How to Identify Basal Cell Carcinoma: Key Characteristics

Pearly or translucent bumps: BCCs often begin as small, shiny, and dome-shaped nodules. The surface may look smooth or waxy, giving it a pearly appearance. These lesions can sometimes appear as

though the skin is "stretched" over the underlying growth.

Telangiectasia (spider veins): Tiny blood vessels, called telangiectasia, often surround the lesion and may be visible through the skin, giving it a reddish or bluish hue.

Flat or slightly elevated, pink or flesh-colored patches: Some BCCs may appear as flat, scaly, or slightly raised pink or flesh-colored areas. These lesions may have a somewhat irregular border and can resemble a wound that doesn't heal.

Ulcerated or crusted centers: As the lesion grows, the center may ulcerate, forming a shallow crater or open wound. This is particularly common in larger BCCs, which may bleed or scab over time.

Location of the Lesion

Basal cell carcinoma frequently appears in areas of the skin most exposed to the sun, such as:

Face: The nose, cheeks, and around the eyes are particularly common sites for BCCs.

Neck and ears: The neck and ears are also common locations, as these areas are often exposed to sun.

Back and chest: Though less frequent, BCCs can appear on the back, chest, or shoulders, particularly in people who engage in outdoor activities.



Scalp and hands: For individuals who wear their hair short or have a history of hand exposure to the sun, these areas can also be affected.

Bleeding or Scabbing

It's important to keep an eye on any skin lesions that bleed easily or form crusts. BCCs are often prone to occasional bleeding or scabbing, especially when scratched or irritated. A wound that doesn't heal or a lesion that

heals and then reopens may be an early warning sign. If you notice any new, changing, or unusual growth on your skin, it's essential to schedule a professional evaluation with a dermatologist. Here are some signs that should prompt you to seek medical attention:

- A lesion that grows, bleeds, or becomes crusty.
- A wound or sore that does not heal or heals and then reopens.
- A bump or nodule that is translucent, waxy, or pearly in appearance.
- A patch of skin that is pink, red, or brown and has irregular edges.

Though basal cell carcinoma is rarely life-threatening, it can cause significant tissue damage if left untreated. The earlier the diagnosis, the more treatment options are available.

Want a Happier Marriage This Year?

Adopt These 7 Habits and Measure Your Progress

If you're like most people, you resolved to "be healthier and happier" this year. But, since the quality of our lives is directly related to the quality of our closest relationships, being healthier and happier is directly connected to the level of happiness you experience in your marriage or partnership.

This means that your goals to exercise, eat healthily, drink less, or learn something new could make you healthy and happier. However, your happiness quotient will increase exponentially if you also set a goal to make your relationship healthy and happier, too.

Begin With the End in Mind - Set A Happy Marriage Goal

You can't improve what you don't measure. To achieve a weight loss goal, you establish a healthy eating and exercise plan, and weigh your progress every day. And, to have a happier marriage, you need to set a goal, establish a plan, and assess your progress regularly.

What is a happy marriage? A happy marriage involves partners who say they experience genuine pleasure, satisfaction, and joyfulness across all aspects of their marriage. Not every moment, or even every day. But, in general, they are highly satisfied with their relationship and each other. That's your goal.

Establish a Plan - Adopt the 7 Happy Couple

John Gottman's research shows that happy, satisfied couples are easy to recognize. So, your action plan should be to do more of what happy couples do. They make their relationship work because they:

• Invest in their friendship so that they are true friends, inti-

mately familiar with each other's world.

- Nurture their fondness and admiration for each other by exchanging positive feelings and focusing on each other's positive qualities and their good times.
- Interact frequently, making sure they connect briefly when parting and reuniting, then for a longer conversation each day, and a regular date night.
- Share power and decision making, seeking common ground when they disagree.
- Solve their solvable problems in ways that settle the issue.
- Cope effectively with ongoing problems, seeking to understand and respect each other's points of view.
- Intentionally discuss and create a philosophy and purpose for their marriage that involves shared values, interests, traditions, and optimistic expectations for their relationship.

Measuring Progress

Measuring progress on your goal to a happier marriage requires paying attention to daily interactions. But don't worry. One thing we know for sure is that the presence of conflict is NOT a sign that you are falling short of your Happier Marriage goal.

Happy couples experience interpersonal conflict and pressures from outside their relationship just as much as unhappy couples. Happy couples just manage conflict well and minimize negativity.

John Gottman suggests that if your conflicts include several more positive than negative moments, you are likely on track toward your marital happiness goal. Specifically, Gottman found that during conflict, successful couples had at least five seconds of time together in a positive (or neutral) emotional state for every one second in a negative state. He calls this the Magic Ratio of 5:1.

So, I encourage couples to strive for at least five positive interactions for every negative one during their conflictual interactions.

To monitor your progress, throughout the next week track your interactions. If you have a conflict, pay close attention to the tone of your comments during the interactions. Did the conflict begin harshly or with criticism? Was sarcasm used? Was negativity reciprocated? Did you interrupt each other? Did the conflict escalate or get out of hand?

Or, conversely, did the interaction begin softly, with a gentle appeal? Did the two of you describe your needs and feelings?

Listen to each other? Respond with understanding? Did one of you try to de-escalate the conflict before it became too negative?


At the end of the week, review your notes and assess the tone of your interactions. Likely your conflicts are a blend of positive and negative sentiments.

If you feel like you fell short of the Magic 5:1 ratio or just want to keep progressing on your overall happier marriage goal, be sure to double down on your efforts to do what happy couples do to make their marriage work.

Focus on investing time in your friendship and nurturing your fondness and admiration for each other. You are much less likely to have frequent, highly negative interactions with your best friend, who you truly like and admire.

Book Review: 365 Thank Yous by John Kralik







Acne: More than Skin Deep

Acne is a common skin condition affecting both adolescents and adults. The causes of acne are multifactorial and include: increase in sebum or oil pro-

duction, hormonal changes, clogged pores, bacteria, and inflammation. Understanding these factors is essential for effective treatment and management.

The fluctuations in hormone levels can lead to an increase in sebum or oil production and therefore will make people more prone to acne. People experiencing puberty, menstruation, and pregnancy experience hormone level fluctuations and make these populations particularly susceptible to acne flares. 

The misperception about New Year's is that it's supposed to be a happy occasion. Sort of like Christmas. Or a birthday party.

But it's not Christmas. New Year's represents the end of something. And goodbyes are not joyous.

New Year's is also a beginning. Beginnings are not entirely happy affairs, either. Beginnings are frightening. You have no idea what you're in for. Could be good. Could be bad.

This year your wife could win the lottery. And when you get home, she might scream, "We won the lottery, honey! Pack



your bags!'

"What?" you might reply. "Should I pack for the beach or the mountains?"

"I don't care!" she might answer. "Just pack your bags and get out of my house!"

Sometimes the worst news you can get is good news.

In many ways, last year was

a rough one. Six of my close friends died. I was a pallbearer twice. That wasn't happy.

But last year was also a year I accumulated new friends.

It all started when I adopted a blind dog. Which I wrote about in this column. Which led to me getting invited to schools for the blind.

I spoke at the Helen Keller Art Show. There, I met Henrietta, who has blindness due to a mitochondrial disease. She has practically grown up in hospitals. One of the happiest people I know. "I'm not fearless," Henrietta said. "I'm brave. There's a difference."

I learned how to use a white cane in the hallways of the Callahan School for the Deaf and Blind. Whereupon a little blind girl traced my face with her little hands and sang "You Are So Beautiful."

I visited Alabama Institute for the Blind and Deaf, where a little boy felt my face, and said, "Will you hug me so I know what you feel like?"

I met a cheerful 17-year-old girl named Morgan. We were at the Service Dogs Alabama training facility.

Morgan has paralysis on the left side of her body, frequent seizures, diabetes. She has low vision, and is blind in one eye. Today, she is a freshman at UAB. Totally independent, thanks to Clarabelle, the black Lab who has saved her life on more than one occasion.

I'll never forget when Morgan squeezed my hand and said, "You have a choice to be hap-

py or sad. And each moment you must consciously make that choice."

I inherited a blind goddaughter named Becca.

I met a kid named Owen, who came to one of my shows. He underwent brain surgery that separates the left from the right hemisphere. He hugged me and said, "You're shorter than I thought."

I met a young woman who is blind, who was a national Braille reading champion. She held my hands and in a happy voice, said, "You're officially one of us now."


In only one year, I was sort of welcomed into the Blind and Deaf community. I have no idea how this happened. Or why. And I don't know what it means.

But I know one thing. And this one thing was told to me by a young man who could not see, hear, or speak. Our conversation was translated by a tactile sign language interpreter.

He said to me, "When I first went blind, I told my mom that this is not the end, Mom. This is just the beginning of an adventure."

And I can't think of better words to begin the new year.










Gulf Financial Market Summary December 2024

• The S&P 500 Index returned +6.0% but underperformed the Russell 2000 Index's month. The MSCI EAFE developed market stock index returned -0.3%, while the MSCI Emerging Market Index returned -2.7%.

Markets Set New All-Time Highs in November's Post-Election Rally

The U.S. presidential election results fueled November's stock market rally, as investors focused on the incoming administration's policy agenda and its implications. The S&P 500 gained +6.0%, its biggest monthly return since November 2023. The index traded above the key 6,000 level and set a new all-time high. Smaller companies took center stage during the broad market rally, with the Russell 2000 surging +11.1% to set a record high. In the bond market, Treasury yields rose after the election due to concerns about increased fiscal spending,

+11.1% return. All eleven S&P 500 sectors traded higher, with Consumer Discretionary and Financials gaining more than +10%. In contrast, defensive sectors, such as Health Care, Utilities, and Consumer Staples, underperformed the S&P 500.

- Corporate investment grade bonds produced a +1.8% total return as Treasury yields declined, marginally outperforming corporate high-yield's +1.6% total return.
- International stocks traded lower for a second consecutive

tax cuts, and large fiscal deficits under the next administration. However, later in the month, yields reversed lower, and bonds posted positive returns. With Republicans taking control of the White House, Senate, and House in January, the following section discusses key policy areas to watch, along with the potential market and economic impacts. Markets drew back sharply in late December due to The Federal Reserve's hint of a SLOW reduction of the prime

Key Policies to Watch in the Next Administration: Investors are monitoring two key areas: tax policy and trade. The administration is expected to focus on extending the tax cuts passed during President Trump's first term. This could stimulate economic growth and boost corporate profits, although it could widen the fiscal deficit. On trade, the administration plans to use tariffs to advance U.S. interests in international affairs and renegotiate trade deals. However, in the near term, tariffs could disrupt supply chains, slow economic growth, and

squeeze profit margins. Other critical policies include immigration and deregulation. There are concerns that tariffs, stricter immigration policies, and expansionary fiscal policy could combine to keep inflation high.


